During my second year of college at the University of Florida, an antisemitic speaker came to my campus to spread hatred and lies against Israel and the Jewish people. I watched first-hand as the Jewish community on my campus grew increasingly hurt as this individual promoted his lecture and the belief that Jews are not equal in society. During this time, I was connected to CUFI on Campus and was provided with the opportunity to host Irving Roth, a Holocaust survivor who committed his legacy to fighting against the evil of antisemitism to prevent the Holocaust from ever occurring again.

At this time, I was hardly in any clubs on campus and had never imagined I would be given the opportunity to host a speaker with such an incredible testimony. I was also, admittedly, worried that I was not qualified to promote the event and fill a classroom for Irving's speech. I do believe, however, that there are moments in life where our weakness and inexperience is for the best. Within a week, I saw how God transformed this fear of not being able to fill a classroom into a fear of hoping my university's auditorium would be big enough to hold over 500 students who came out to hear Irving share his story of surviving one of the world's greatest tragedies and witness his determination toward ensuring the next generation will forever see a brighter tomorrow.

After hosting Irving with CUFI on Campus, I was blessed with the opportunity to travel across the Holy Land with other pro-Israel students from across the country as a Bonhoeffer Fellow. Throughout this fellowship, I found my greatest friends and discovered an everlasting love for Israel and her people. I witnessed how a democracy can exist in the heart of the Middle East, where Christians are invited to pray at some of the holiest sites tied to our faith. This trip encouraged me to continue remaining active as the chapter president of the CUFI on Campus chapter at my university, where I was able to work with other students to educate our community on the US-Israel relationship and raise money for organizations like Save A Child's Heart, which provides life-saving heart surgeries to children throughout the Middle East.

Without CUFI on Campus, I would not have discovered my love for Israel and my passion for standing with the Jewish people. Today, I am grateful to be able to work as the Digital Media Associate for Christians United for Israel, where I inform the organization's members about current events surrounding Israel and the broader Middle East online. The lessons I have learned as a student through CUFI on Campus have equipped me to not only understand the importance of this role each day but to understand the lasting impact it has on dispelling the anti-Israel narrative that continues to spread on our campuses and throughout our country by shedding light on the truth and believing in God's faithfulness.

The rest of the event was a blur as I learned more about Israel's plight and our responsibility to the Jews. I remember calling my mother each night and enthusiastically spilling out all of the information that was presented (I slept really well that week, I won't lie).

After that I went to the Summit every year I could and was accepted into the CUFI on Campus Bonhoeffer Scholarship to Israel. That was a life-changing experience.

Since then, I was given the amazing opportunity to speak at an Irving Roth event in my state, talk to my home church about CUFI, start a CUFI chapter at University of New Mexico, and actually become part of the staff at CUFI on Campus!

The thing that immediately came to mind when you asked me to write up a testimony about how CUFI on Campus impacted me was that CUFI on Campus trained, equipped, and empowered me as a student leader for the job I have now within CUIF on Campus. Davis was the guinea pig campus for SJP to push their divestment legislation for the first time in a consolidated and coordinated effort. And while we did hold them off for 2 years, it was exhausting and defeating emotionally to be in those divestment Senate hearings each semester one or two times a week – sometimes from 5 pm to 2 am. Luckily, I had Josh and Jessica to coach me on how to write speeches, coalition build with other organizations, prep for divestment hearings, and so much more. With their help, I felt like I did indeed have a voice and had a message to give to my campus. Even though those years were hard, looking back I wouldn't trade those years for anything because they built character, they helped me to know in detail every strategy and argument of SJP, and they trained me for the job I know have empowering students to pass IHRA on their campuses!

I remember always feeling so defeated as a student because I was always on the defensive side of every form of pro-Israel activism on my campus – and especially in Student Government in divestment hearings. But with IHRA, our side is now on the offensive! As a student in 2013-2014, I never could have imagined that the pro-Israel community could now have such a strong voice in SGA and pass such powerful legislation to protect the Jewish community and to stand up for Israel. It is incredible to see how many pieces of IHRA legislation have been passed in the US just this year. I think it is close to all the BDS pieces of legislation that SJP passed over the course of 7 years. In a way, helping these students pass IHRA is redeeming everything I went through as a college student and ensuring that others don't have to go through it as well.

In 2008, I spent a month backpacking in Israel. I fell in love with the people of this amazing country, and as I visited place after place in Israel, I could sense their very real desire for peace—and the very real danger sometimes only kilometers away, or even in their own neighborhoods.

As a young Christian student focusing on history and politics, I returned to campus at Portland State University, in my hometown of Portland, Oregon. I was looking to learn more about this place and its role in the region. I was shocked to find that contrary to what I had seen with my own eyes, professors on my campus were presenting a biased and inflammatory false narrative about Israel. I began to write and speak about my own experience in Israel, and to push back on the misinformation that professors and outside activists were saying. I saw my friends in our small Jewish community become more and more intimidated as one anti-Israel speaker after another made the rounds on campus. Even an anti-Israel rap group that calls Israelis Nazis in their lyrics was invited to perform at a grade school just around the corner from my campus. I will never forget a young Jewish student pleading with the school board not to allow this group to call his Israeli mother a nazi in this grade school, nor will I forget the photo the principal took with the rap group, despite the Jewish community's pleas. I was doing my best to support the Jewish community and to speak up, but I was alone and unable to do anything of significance to help put an end to these activities in my own community.

Then I found CUFI on Campus.

With just one phone call, I had a whole world of support and resources to effectively share the truth of Israel on my campus. In addition to coaching me on several interviews on local news, CUFI arranged for me to speak about what was happening on my campus on national television. We hosted Irving Roth, a Holocaust Survivor, IDF General Bentzi Gruber, television host Erick Stakelbeck, and several events to educate Christian students on the importance of supporting Israel. CUFI made the difference between one voice trying to make a difference to an effective, supported, activist that was able to make a true difference on my campus, and educate students and faculty alike. Since then, I have had the privilege of working on the CUFI team as staff, first, through directing CUFI on Campus in 2013 and 2014, then by heading

up Israel Collective, CUFI's outreach to high profile leaders across the nation. Through working for CUFI, we have been enabled to reach thousands of key leaders and students—and millions more via social media. Today, because of the support of CUFI as a student, I can say my time and experience as a CUFI On Campus activist has touched millions of lives.
