The AAA uses these precedents and operates within the established legal parameters.
- Academic Freedom: The Act explicitly protects academic freedom and open discourse. Recognizing the importance of open debate, the Act ensures that steps to counteract antisemitism do not impede scholarly discussion or legitimate criticism of policies and ideas.

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WHY THE ANTISEMITISM AWARENESS ACT IS NEEDED?

- The AAA is a response to the skyrocketing antisemitism that emerged in the aftermath of the 10/7 attacks in Israel, especially on college campuses. It provides clear guidelines to support institutions in addressing and combating antisemitism.
